THE FABIAN SOCIETY

The Fabian Society is an independent left-leaning think tank and a democratic membership society with almost 7,000 members. We influence political and public thinking and provide a space for broad and open-minded debate.

We publish insight, analysis and opinion in print and online; conduct research and undertake major policy inquiries; convene conferences, speaker meetings and roundtables; and facilitate member debate and activism right across the UK.

As a think tank we have a reputation for high-quality, politically salient outputs that have a real impact on political and policy debate. Our staff team in London, Manchester and Edinburgh works with leading politicians and policy experts to develop and promote new ideas and to influence the climate of political opinion. We are affiliated to the Labour party and work very closely with Labour politicians, as well as influencing debate across the political spectrum. Hundreds of senior Labour politicians are members of the society, including Labour leader Keir Starmer MP and more than half of his shadow cabinet.

We are a membership society and our members are at the heart of everything we do. People become Fabians because they agree with our political values and want to support out work, and to access our content and participate in our events and activities. Our members set the society's direction through our democratic structures and they shape our programme as contributors and volunteers. Each year hundreds of activities are organised by and for our members by autonomous sections of the society - the Young Fabians, the Fabian Women's Network, the Scottish Fabians, the Welsh Fabians – and by Fabian networks and affiliated local Fabian societies.

The Fabian Society is a socialist organisation which aims to promote:

- Greater equality of power, wealth and opportunity
- The value of collective action and public service
- An accountable, tolerant and active democracy
- Citizenship, liberty and human rights
- Sustainable development
- Multilateral international cooperation

Fabianism

The Fabian tradition informs how we think and what we do. Our commitment to Fabianism means we support the fight against inequality, the power of collective action and an internationalist outlook. We believe in social progress, evidence, expertise, rationality and long-termism. We advocate gradualist, reformist and democratic means in a journey towards radical ends. As a society, we celebrate our historic achievements and champion the collectivist institutions built by Fabians. We promote Fabian arguments within politics today and support the political development of people who share our values.

Supporting the Labour party

As a Labour affiliate, we support the party in its efforts to win power at every level across the UK and to turn political ideas into real improvements in people's lives. Working closely with Fabian MPs and shadow ministers, we act as an independent-minded, critical friend, providing fresh thinking, addressing tough questions facing the party, and presenting viewpoints that can influence the direction it takes.

Pluralism and debate

We are a pluralist movement that creates spaces and networks for open debate, to discuss political challenges and advance new thinking. We platform a diversity of opinion, and constructive disagreement is expected and respected. As an organisation we have no collective positions and we do not campaign for particular policies. Everyone who writes or speaks for the Fabians does so in their own name, without committing the society.

Equality and inclusion

We strive to make the British left more diverse, equal and inclusive and to ensure that the left's ideas can create a more equal and inclusive society. We seek to create equal opportunities for political participation, in our own work and beyond, for people on the left from every background and identity. We work especially hard to platform and support people from communities which are underrepresented in the Fabian Society and public life.

1. Support the Labour party to win the next general election and return to government

by generating evidence and informing debate on political and campaign strategy; creating platforms for Labour to present and test its ideas; and seeking to influence political and public opinion in ways that boost Labour's electoral prospects

2. Secure the adoption of transformative Fabian policy proposals in the next UK Labour manifesto and in policy platforms at every level

by developing and packaging together evidenced, workable, transformative and popular policy ideas; deepening our strong collaborative relationships with Labour decision makers; and expanding our UKwide influence and policy capacity

3. Help to build a strong, united and diverse Labour movement

by building bridges across the left and showcasing pluralist, respectful politics; improving equality, inclusion and diversity both within the society and the party; and supporting the political development and advancement of Fabians and people with Fabian perspectives

4. Strengthen the capabilities, activism and reach of the society

by improving our financial position, staff capabilities and use of digital and data; expanding member-led debate and policy activity; and building our profile through stronger marketing, communications and media.

Accountability and transparency

The society is committed to accountability, transparency and ethical fundraising. We are led by a democratically elected executive committee consisting of members representing all parts of the society. Elections take place every two years. The executive reports to the society's annual general meeting which takes place in November. The rules and by-laws of the Fabian Society are the society's constitution. Rules are approved by general meetings, by-laws are approved by the executive committee. Autonomous sections of the society and local Fabian societies also have their own constitutions.

The Fabian Society is funded by our members and subscribers; by organisations which award us grants and sponsorships in connection with specific projects; and by sales of publications and event tickets. Our funding relationships are governed by a fundraising policy, approved by our executive committee. In particular, this stipulates that we will not accept funding from companies whose practices are deemed to be unethical; and that we do not carry out lobbying projects.

Independence

The Fabian Society has editorial control over all our publications. Funding partners are invited to comment on draft outputs when they have relevant expertise but are not permitted to determine the contents of what we publish. The society is entirely independent from the Labour party. Our editorial output is not shaped or controlled by the party in any way.

CHAIR'S REPORT

It has been an honour to serve as chair of the Fabian Society this year. As a member of both Keir Starmer's shadow cabinet and the Fabian executive committee I am living proof of the strong ties between the society and the Labour party. With my frontbench colleagues on the executive - Anneliese Dodds, Sonny Leong, Seema Malhotra and Wes Streeting we see every day the value the society brings to the Labour party's policy thinking and political debate.

I am very proud of the quality and quantity of the work produced by the Fabians in the 12 months from June 2022 to July 2023. The highlights included our New Year conference which had a stellar line-up of Labour shadow ministers led by Rachel Reeves; a serious and wide-ranging pamphlet on foreign policy from David Lammy; and the society's eagerly anticipated review of adult social care, which included some proposals which have already been adopted by Labour. Beyond these there were many dozens of policy events, a series of influential research reports and some brilliant commissioned reports from politicians and policy experts. Our small staff team have achieved an amazing amount during the year, working under Andrew Harrop's leadership. I thank them for their expertise, dedication and good spirit.

During my year as chair, I temporarily relinquished my duties as the society's treasurer. They were ably discharged by acting treasurer Sonny Leong, my good friend in the House of Lords.



It was certainly the right time for him to steward the society's finances. After some challenging periods over the last decade, I am absolutely delighted to see a significant rise in income this year and a healthy surplus. My thanks to Sonny for his expert oversight of the society's money and operations.

Over the year, our membership numbers held near steady, although I want to see the society grow again as the Labour party heads closer to power. The activism of our members continued to define what we are as an organisation, with countless activities over the year organised by and for Fabians. I am grateful to everyone involved in the inspiring work of the Scottish Fabians, Welsh Fabians, Young Fabians and Fabian Women's Network. I am impressed by the growing number of policy groups and pay tribute to the brilliant local Fabian societies who have found their feet again after the pandemic.

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I also want to thank my colleagues on the executive committee who have served alongside me, representing members' interests, by providing direction and oversight for the society. The diversity of the Fabian Society is well represented on the committee, and this will be even more the case in the future following changes to the makeup of the committee agreed at the 2022 AGM. For the first time we have designated places for politicians from Wales, Scotland and the English regions, plus an elected convenor for local Fabian societies and Fabian councillors. I want to end by thanking one EC member in particular – Seema Malhotra MP – who is standing down this Autumn after an extraordinary 24 years on the committee. Thank you Seema for devoting so much to the Fabians.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Fabian Society has stood by the Labour party through good times and bad. For all of us, 2022-23 was a year of rising hope and anticipation. With Labour riding high in the polls, the prospect of a return to national power was no longer remote. The society's role in shaping Labour policy thinking has never been more important.

Looking back on a packed period from July 2022 to June 2023, the society can be proud of the influence it has had. The 18 months before a general election is the time where parties' policy commitments start to firm up. We were delighted that the programme agreed at Labour's 2023 conference included several important Fabian proposals. These covered broadband social tariffs, an office for value for money, the design of a National Care Service, fair pay agreements, development on the green belt, bus franchise reform and the taxation of private schools.

A particular highlight was our work for Unison and the Labour party on the roadmap to a National Care Service. The society has produced a plan for adult social care reform which stands a genuine chance of becoming the blueprint for a comprehensive care service for England. The report containing these proposals was just one of seven research outputs published during a fruitful period for our expanded research team.



Other papers published during the year covered music education, pension reform, English devolution and employment insurance. We also continued our electoral strategy research, with work on how to win in Scotland, rural areas and coastal communities. The research team was also kept busy with major projects on regional inequality and pre-retirement poverty that were still underway as the year ended.

Our commissioned editorial output included three essay collections that examined community power, rural social policy and enduring centre-left values. On top of that we published five full-length pamphlets. Stewart Lansley wrote on the case for equality and Will Somerville and Sarah Mulley wrote on migration reform. Three MPs published pamphlets - Liam Byrne on the case for freedom, Kim Leadbeater on health and wellbeing, and David Lammy on foreign policy. The shadow foreign secretary's excellent report was another sign of the strength of the relationship between the society and the Labour frontbench.

The four quarterly editions of the Fabian Review covered Labour's future electoral coalition, the cost of living crisis, long-term challenges facing the UK and the reshaping of public opinion. The Fabian website continued to provide a lively stream of articles, including from emerging writers. We also launched a new podcast, Fabian Thinking, which interviews Fabian authors to delve deeper into the ideas behind our publications.

After the upheaval of the pandemic years, 2022-23 saw the return of a full 12-month cycle of in-person events. In July we hosted a Westminster lecture by Scottish Labour leader Anas Sarwar MP. Our packed Labour party conference programme of 27 events included panel sessions, roundtables and receptions. In January Rachel Reeves, shadow chancellor and lifelong Fabian, delivered the keynote address at our New Year conference. Over the rest of the year there was a regular drumbeat of speaker events, seminars and report launches, including a lecture by David Lammy and a speech from Wes Streeting responding to our National Care Service report. Our events also featured Mark Drakeford, Bridget Phillipson, Ed Miliband, Jonathan Reynolds, Anneliese Dodds and many other Labour figures.

Such a broad and impactful programme was only possible thanks to the outstanding contribution of the society's dedicated staff team under the leadership of Katie Curtis (events and membership), Kate Murray (editorial) and Luke Raikes (research). Wherever I go people are surprised by how much quality work we produce with such a small team of employees.

During the year we thanked and bid farewell to Josh Abey, John Rafferty and Vanesha Singh and welcomed Rory O'Brien, Sasjkia Otto and Iggy Wood, plus Phil Mutero, our former finance and operations director, as a consultant.

It was a strong year for the society's finances thanks to the return of in-person events and their related funding partnerships. Our income increased by 20 per cent to £975,000, and we secured a welcome surplus to help strengthen our reserves. Membership was down slightly, falling 2 per cent to 6,756 individuals and institutions, which was better than we might have expected during a cost of living crisis.

The society's volunteer-led activity continued to flourish. The Fabian Women's Network delivered another cycle of our pioneering mentoring scheme for women in politics and public life. The Young Fabians and Welsh Fabians both organised successful and stimulating events, as did our much-loved local Fabian societies and our expanding network of policy groups. The Scottish Fabians, under the leadership of Martin McCluskey and Katherine Sangster, had a particularly successful year. They embedded their position at the heart of the Labour family in Scotland, with events, electoral analysis and in-depth policy research.

As ever my thanks to all Fabian members and volunteers, who are the heart of the society; to everyone who contributed to our programme by writing and speaking; to the leadership provided by the executive committee under Roy Kennedy; and to my brilliant staff team. The Fabian Society is helping build the foundations for Labour's return to power.

YOUNG FABIANS

It was another productive year for the Young Fabians and I am proud of what we accomplished. As we approach the general election, we are in good health to shape the future of the left.

Impact and outputs

We returned our magazine, Anticipations, to quarterly production. This was our top priority, giving members the chance to write and for every member in the country to receive a magazine by young people, for young people. I'm proud of Jimmy Sergi and Lauren Davison for leading this work.

We also launched two pamphlets: An Economic Lens to Recovering The Heartlands and Gendered Impact of the Pandemic. Our blog continued to produce content, giving members the chance to publish their ideas. Our podcast also produced monthly episodes.

In March, we held the inaugural Dick Leonard Memorial Lecture, in honour of our founder. We heard from former Greek prime minister George Papandreou, introduced by Mark Leonard. My thanks to Panny Antoniou and Cecilia Jastrembska.

At the Fabian New Year Conference, we hosted a "kitchen table" debate with a revolving door of speakers who debated the housing crisis. My thanks to Hollie Wickens.



We adopted a transphobia policy which covers all of our work, led by safeguarding officer Leon Alleyne-McLaughlin.

All of this wouldn't have been possible without Owen Bell, who every Sunday evening produced our weekly newsletter.

Developing the policymakers of the future

Our vice-chair, Amy Dwyer, did stellar work in creating our mentoring scheme. This saw over 130 Young Fabians take part in 1:1 sessions, with over 70 per cent based outside of London.

We conducted a survey of members to understand what they wanted from the Young Fabians, giving legitimacy to our agenda. Plus, we held an open day for new members to get more involved.

Our YF Academy continued to host events with a focus on training our membership in skills such as speechwriting. Additionally, we launched our Women's Advocacy Group.

The decentralisation agenda continued under the stewardship of George Fairhurst. Every region and nation of Great Britain now has a Young Fabian group after the launch of our group in Wales.

We have continued our full membership of the Young European Socialists, with members going on trips abroad, including Belgium and France.

Fundraising for the future of the Left

2023 was the 25th anniversary of our annual Boat Party. We raised thousands of pounds, helped by sponsorship from SEC Newgate, and hundreds of pounds for Shelter through our raffle auction. I want to thank Ellie Anderson for pulling off a spectacular evening.

Furthermore, our Friends of the Young Fabians scheme continues to raise funds which helps us to cover our costs.

Legacy

It has been another amazing year and I want to thank our brilliant membership, the executive committee and our officers from our networks and groups for their hard work. The Young Fabians is a special place and you have an important role to protect and enhance our legacy.

FABIAN WOMEN'S NETWORK

Mentoring

The FWN mentoring program continues to be a great success. 26 members of Cohort 12 have just returned from their Barnsley weekend. The energy and enthusiasm were matched by the level of skills training.

This year was enhanced by the help of Roberta Blackman-Woods and Natasa Pantelic. There was also an inspiring visit from Stephanie Peacock MP. And there wasn't a dry eye in the house after Dan Jarvis MP told us his personal story of wanting to stand.

The cohort have been prolific in their offers of peer-to-peer skills training, which has been innovative and very well facilitated.

Networking

The Fabian Women's Network continues to support women in public life through informal networking. WhatsApp groups allow women in the network to make connections where specific expertise is needed and to highlight the work of women in the network. Mentees report that they have been able to make significant professional links to support their work through the informal networks.



There are also WhatsApp groups dedicated to policy areas including housing, health, education, diversity, Labour party history, arts and media, government, law, and international development.

Policy work

During the year, FWN pursued policy work linked to women in the criminal justice system. After a series of roundtables, a booklet, Solidarity, Equality and Opportunity: Creating Strong Social Justice Systems for Women was launched at Labour Party Conference 2022 with an event which included women with lived experience of the justice system, MPs and others.

The response was so great that a follow-up event was held in parliament, where women from across the justice sector joined parliamentarians to talk about the issues that cause female offending and the impact of female imprisonment.

A third event in the impact of maternal imprisonment took place at the 2023 conference.

At the Fabian New Year Conference, we organised a panel event on Black women's health.

Support

Members of the women's network continue to report how supportive and welcoming the network is in their work. We have been described as a "haven" and a "safe space". As well as providing moral support the network also offers an opportunity for networking and professional support.

There are now over 250 trained mentees in the network. We are exploring ways in which we can improve the ways that mentees can contact each other, including the possibility of an on-line database, funds permitting.

It is also envisaged that this database of women experts in the Fabian Society could be used to improve the diversity of speakers and writers for the Fabian Society.

Equalities

We are actively monitoring the selection of women candidates for the election. With the suspension of all women shortlists there is a concern that the number of Labour MPs who are women would drop. Several members of the Fabian Women's Network have put themselves forward for selection and have reported problems with the procedure. We have had reports of women feeling that they are on a shortlist to improve diversity with no chance of selection. The network will continue to support women who put themselves forward.

SCOTTISH FABIANS

The influence of the Scottish Fabians continues to grow. Our Winning Back the First Red Wall report received widespread media coverage both in Scotland and in the rest of the UK.

Just as UK Labour must recapture seats in the north lost to the Tories, the challenge for Scottish Labour is to appeal to key voters who make up the "heartlands" of Scotland. In September 2022, the Scottish Fabians ran an event at UK Labour party conference featuring this research and subsequent focus groups that we had conducted these key target voters in Scotland.

In this report the Scottish Fabians analysed the granular geographical and voter preference data generated by local elections in Scotland. Our analysis quantified the size of the opportunity for Labour and demonstrated that 25 seats are within its grasp by targeting "soft" SNP voters that are open to voting Labour and represent 1 in 5 of SNP voters. Our focus groups showed that it is failing public services and the cost of living crisis that blights these voters' lives. Therefore, the task for Scottish Labour is to speak to those voters, particularly younger and more aspirational voters, about the economy, public services, and the cost-ofliving crisis.

The focus of Scottish Labour should be to demonstrate a clear difference between the SNP and Labour in terms of policy in Scotland and the Tories in the UK.



The Scottish Fabians have a huge part to play in this, and over the last year have worked closely with Scottish Labour MSPs to support policy debate and development.

We held a roundtable in the Scottish Parliament and at Scottish Labour conference on social security reform within the devolved powers of the Scottish parliament.

In this year, our national manager Katherine Sangster has also written for The Scotsman, The Guardian and the i.

Opinion pieces were contributed by members of Senedd such as Jack Sargent MS, Huw Irranca-Davies MS, Jane Hutt MS and Carolyn Thomas MS as well as our Welsh MPs such as Christina Rees MP and Carolyn Harris MP.

It has been my pleasure to regularly update our Welsh Fabians blog, as well as to manage prominent figures in politics and public affairs to contribute.

LOCAL FABIAN SOCIETIES

Local Fabian Societies were hit hard by the pandemic and the country's slow return to normal life. Sadly a number have wound up since 2020 and we have fewer groups meeting today than for several years. But nevertheless, there were some wonderful activities organised by local societies in every corner of the country. The societies came together for our annual secretaries meeting in the Spring to update each other on all their work.

Congratulations to Brighton and Hove Fabians who celebrated their 80th anniversary. Their president Baroness Joyce Gould hosted a summer garden party in glorious weather, with a speech from national chair Roy Kennedy.

Central London Fabians have pioneered mobile meetings in recent years. On one memorable occasion they hosted a guided walk of Walworth in south London that took in the former Labour party headquarters and the home of Ada Salter.

County Durham Fabians continued to be among our most active groups, with five meetings over the year. Attendance increased and there were discussions on devolution, local cuts, the cost of living, further education and a lecture on the historic Spennymoor Settlement.

The Fabian outpost in Grimsby also continued to host stimulating meetings. The highlight was a presentation by Ben Cooper from the Fabian Society research team on his work on what Labour needs to do to win in towns like Grimsby.

There was also plenty of interest in opening new Fabian societies. The year saw the launch of Northampton Fabians, organised by Mike Reader, former chair of Newham Fabians and now the Labour candidate in Northampton South. The new group has already started feeding in ideas following the financial collapse of the Conservative council. Croydon and Sutton Fabians relaunched after a quiet few years, with a meeting on challenges and opportunities for local government and a brand new website.

Reading Fabians are among those societies who have struggled to relaunch face-to-face meetings after Covid. They have retained virtual events and recently held an excellent meeting on donut economics.

It was all change at Peterborough Fabians, where Brian Keegan stood down as secretary after serving in the post almost continuously since 1978. All of us at the national Fabian Society send our very best to Brian and huge thanks for an extraordinary tenure.

In sadder news, we were devastated to hear of the unexpected death of Ian Taylor. He was the beating heart of Bournemouth Fabians and secretary for over 40 years. Under lan's tenure Bournemouth Fabians were consistently the largest Fabian society in the country and for many years organised South West regional conferences. Ian was a devoted servant of the Fabian Society who is very much missed.

FABIAN POLICY GROUPS

Education policy group

The Fabian Education policy group continued to be very active during this last year. Two events were held in the House of Commons in this period, as well as monthly zoom meetings with prestigious speakers for members and meetings of the executive group.

The autumn term House of Commons event was on early years, in line with Labour's policy manifesto commitments and interest in this area. The second event was on OFSTED, which was then in the furore over the sad death of headteacher Ruth Perry. We read a statement from Professor Julia Waters and held a minute's silence for Ruth.

Both meetings had our usual format of five national and international speakers and then around an hour of Q&A with policy discussions and contributions from national policymakers; system leaders; professors; trade union inputs; and professional bodies. They were both valuable events to hold and information on the events was distributed to a wide number of MPs

Finance and economic policy group

The Fabian Finance and Economic Policy group received strong interest from members in the 2022-23 period. We're confident there will be fertile ground when new convenors are appointed, and look forward to further information on how to elect new convenors.



The last financial year has been positive with strong performances from the society's major income sources. We ended the year in a financially secure and confident position.

Membership income remained steady despite a rise in the cost of living. I would like to express my sincere gratitude to Fabian members who have continued to support the organisation through membership fees, donations, and legacies. Without your support we would not be able to sustain the level of activity reflected in this report. Your generous contributions go a long way in making sure the Fabians' work progresses.
